Welcome to JMS! We want to share with you what good hands your child will be in joining the Jaguar Family. At JMS we "pride" ourselves on providing an enriching and supportive learning environment that not only develops the academic mind, but the whole student. The characteristics that make your Jefferson Middle School such an innovative and successful learning community start with a shared vision on our core purpose. We bring our vision to life with a positive school-wide collaborative team attitude, maintaining a learner's posture by being professionally reflective and proactive support towards developmental changes of a middle school student, and by offering a variety of core and focused opportunities to enhance your child's growth and learning. We have included our "Jefferson Middle School At-A-Glance" in this packet to share with you some of these key offerings and opportunities for your child. Our core strengths include strong and caring teachers, encouraged and challenged through the support of a school leadership team and professional learning community who are all committed to student achievement and the belief in every child's potential for greatness.

JMS begins each year with a School Wide Positive Behavior Support (SWPBS) assembly. This assembly sets the foundation for student expectations and provides a roadmap for their success. We continue with these themes and support then each month at our R.E.A.L recognition and character education assemblies. At our monthly SWPBS assemblies students are recognized by their teachers in the categories of **Academic Achievement**, **Being R.E.A.L** (Exhibiting Responsibility & Respect, Exploration, Achievement, and Leadership) and **Student of the Month** (Showing our J.A.G.U.A.R behavior expectations of: Jefferson community will **Act** responsibly, **Give** their best effort, Utilize their strengths, **Achieve** their academic potential, & **Respect** their community).

Through our **School-Wide Literacy Campaign** teachers model critical thinking skills coupled with teaching the **7 Habits of Effective Readers** to teach students how to be cognitive thinkers and learners. This also leads the students to participate in our **Million Word Campaign** to reach each grade level reading standards and grow as a reader and learner.

The MATHCOUNTS program is a national middle school math competition that promotes mathematics achievement through a series of fun and engaging "bee" style contests. Jefferson students have achieved the *Gold Status* within this program. Each year we have teams compete at the State level championships. Our 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> grade students have the opportunity to participate in **The California Junior Scholarship Federation (CJSF)** which emphasizes high standards of scholarship and community service for middle school students.

As part of our **College** and **Career Readiness** program, JMS dedicates a week of intense focus across campus where students learn about the steps beginning in middle school through high school to apply for college, and learn about the various university and college programs available. We conclude the week with **Career Day**, inviting our community speak with students about careers and the pathways to reach these positions. To support student career and college pathway learning and goal setting, JMS implemented **Naviance**. In the 8<sup>th</sup> grade students' self-assess talents and skills, set goals, and assess college readiness as an effective tool for planning high school classes.

Students achieving and maintaining a 3.9+ (may be subject to change) are invited to attend Leadership camps such as The Pali Institute (6<sup>th</sup> Grade), Astro Camp (7<sup>th</sup> Grade) and CIMI (Catalina Island Marine Institute) for our 8<sup>th</sup> grade students.

**GATE** - Quarterly JMS <u>and</u> GATE Parent Advisory committee planned activities, events and after-school enrichment classes are in place for our GATE students.

## Countdown to SUCCESS!!!!

- ➤ Learn everything that you can about your child's school. The more you know, the easier your job as a parent will be.
- ➤ Get acquainted and show your <u>interest</u> in your child's teachers. Tell them what they need to know about your child. If he/she has special needs, make these known from the beginning.
- Attend school events. Go to sports events, concerts, monthly student celebration assemblies, Back-to School night, Open House, Math Family Night, College Night, etc.

#### ➤ Get involved –

- o With the parent organizations (PTSA, SSC, ELMAC, councils etc.) If you are unable to attend meetings, review the agenda and minutes from the meeting.
- o By staying on top of our online Student Information System "Parent Connect" Check it at least weekly to track your child's academic progress, attendance, and behavior. Celebrate successes!
- o Check our School Website for news!
- o Ensure you are receiving our weekly "Paw Print E-Newsletter" emailed out each Monday. Check your Spam Folder or Junk Mail Box!
- ➤ <u>Volunteer</u> at your school with supervision, chaperoning at dances, fundraising, or be a parent representative for advisory committees. Yes, Middle School definitely **needs and wants you** to be involved.
- ➤ <u>Be prepared</u> to listen as well as talk at parent conferences. It helps to write out questions beforehand and be prepared to take notes during the conference and ask for an explanation if you don't understand something.
- ➤ <u>Talk with your child.</u> Talking and listening play major roles in children's school success. Show them that you're interested in what they have to say. When your child talks to you, stop what you're doing and pay attention. Look at them and ask questions to let them know that you've heard what they have said. Occasionally repeat what they say to let them know you're listening closely.
- Let your child know that you think education is important. Create a special place for your child to study. Provide and keep the supplies/resources in that special place. Set a regular time for homework. Monitor homework. Remove distractions by turning off the TV, limiting the noise and social telephone calls. Check their planner everyday.
- > Be positive, make positive, helpful suggestions, and communicate high expectations.


Dear Jefferson Families,

As we close in on the end of the school year and welcome in our incoming 6<sup>th</sup> grade class, there is typically talk of class placement and teachers. This is not a matter taken lightly at Jefferson and a lot of thought and time, typically the months between spring and throughout the summer, is put into the process and procedures followed to place students and develop a comprehensive school Master Schedule. A layer of the process in building cohesive, balanced groups of students, and a working Master Schedule involves the intricate structure of classes to ensure each grade level is functioning appropriate at each grade level, across each period, and within the whole school big picture of the Master Schedule. One change of one student within the Master Schedule can cause a large domino effect to many other students and classes. We strive to match the needs and characteristics of the class with the skills of the receiving teaching team where possible.

Due to the impact at the start and end of a school year we reserve the right to not take specific teacher requests, and **do not** hold 'teacher request' meetings. We will accept a written letter written regarding your child's learning style, areas for growth, and talents to assist with placement. While this input is welcome and helpful for our team, understand this letter is one of the many factors we must consider in forming classes. The final decision on class placements resides with the school.

#### The Bubble Wrap Boy By: Earle, Phil

Fourteen-year-old social outcast Charlie Han, known as "the short Chinese kid" at school, searches for a talent to improve his popularity, but when he discovers skateboarding, much to the disapproval of his overprotective mother, he also uncovers a huge family secret.

#### The Courage Test By: Preller, James

Will has no choice. His father drags him along on a wilderness adventure in the footsteps of legendary explorers Lewis and Clark--whether he likes it or not. All the while, Will senses that something about this trip isn't quite right. Along the journey, Will meets fascinating strangers and experiences new thrills, including mountain cliffs, whitewater rapids, and a heart-hammering bear encounter. It is a journey into the soul of America's past, and the meaning of family in the future. In the end, Will must face his own, life-changing test of courage. A father-and-son journey along the Lewis and Clark Trail-from Fort Mandan to the shining sea--offers readers a genre-bending blend of American history, thrilling action, and personal discovery.

While salvaging and rebuilding in the aftermath of the Galveston flood of 1900, sixteen-year-old Seth proves himself in a way that his previous efforts never could, but he still must face his father man-to-man.

#### Drowned City: Hurricane Katrina and New Orleans By: Brown, Don

On August 29, 2005, Hurricane Katrina's monstrous winds and surging water overwhelmed the protective levees around low-lying New Orleans, Louisiana. Eighty percent of the city flooded, in some places under twenty feet of water. Property damages across the Gulf Coast topped \$100 billion. One thousand eight hundred and thirty-three people lost their lives. The riveting tale of this historic storm and the drowning of an American city is one of selflessness, heroism, and courage - and also of incompetence, racism, and criminality. Don Brown's kinetic art and as-it-happens narrative capture both the tragedy and triumph of one of the worst natural disasters in American history.

#### Flash Fire By: Cooney, Caroline

Lost in the Labyrinth By: Kindl, Patrice

Fourteen-year-old Princess Xenodice tries to prevent the death of her half-brother, the Minotaur, at the hands of the Athenian prince, Theseus, who is aided by Icarus, Daedalus and her sister Ariadne.

Medusa By: Hirschmann, Kris

Describes the history of the legend of Medusa, including the ancient Greek myth of Perseus and the Gorgons, representations of Medusa in art, and modern versions of the monster in popular culture.

Quicksilver By: Spinner, Stephanie

Hermes, Prince of Thieves and son of Zeus, relates why the seasonal change, the history of the Trojan War, his friendship with Pegasus, and many more adventures.

Wild Girl By: Giff, Patricia Reilly

When twelve-year-old Lidie leaves Brazil to join her father and brother on a horse ranch in New York, she has a hard time adjusting to her changed circumstances, as does a new horse that has come to the ranch.

### Class Descriptions:

- Beginning Band (Yearlong class) This class is for anyone who has never played an instrument and would like learn. In addition, Beginning Band is for incoming 6<sup>th</sup> graders who have played an instrument in elementary school. We offer all wind instruments, including but not limited to flute, clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, trombone, baritone and tuba, plus all percussion instruments. You do not have to have any music experience. Beginning Band will perform 3 times throughout the year, including a trip to Disneyland for a band competition.
- Chorus (Yearlong class) This class is for any student who enjoys singing. Singing or musical experience is not required. The JMS Chorus performs a minimum of 5 times throughout the school year, including a trip to either Disneyland or Knott's for a competition, and then a concluding performance at the JMS Spring musical.
- 21st Century Journalism, Digital Media & Design and Publication: (Yearlong class for: 6th/7th/8th)
  This course is for students with strong writing and technical skills. The course requires an completed application see either the attached, website, or Google Form.
